TLIA Proposed Amendments to Articles of Incorporation and By Laws

These proposed amendments will be voted on at the TLIA Annual Meeting

Articles of Incorporation Proposed Amendment Article VII

All persons, co partnerships, associations or corporations owning, or being the contract purchaser of, real property within ~~one-half mile~~ one mile radius of the shore line of Upper Twin or Lower Twin Lakes, in Kootenai County, Idaho shall be eligible for membership in this association.

Explanation

The membership previously voted (in 2019) to change the property ownership radius from the Lakes shore line from one-half mile to one mile. However, the prior authorized change was focused on the By Law language and did not correct the identical language in the Articles of Incorporation. This change will change the Articles of Incorporation language. It will make Article VII, Articles of Incorporation reflect the membership intent that ownership of property within one mile of the lake shoreline are eligible for membership.

By Laws Proposed Amendment

Article IV Board of Directors

Section 5. ~~There shall be no regularly scheduled meetings of the Board of Directors~~ The Board of Directors may set the schedule of its meetings as it determines is in the best interest of the corporation; however, the Board shall meet at least two (2) times each year at a mutually agreed time and place for routine business and information exchange. Special meetings may be called by the President or by any four (4) members of the Board with five (5) days' notice, (6) notice. Notice to the Board of Directors can be made by any electronic form.

Explanation

The level of corporation activities, including projects, fundraising, and advocacy to various agencies in behalf of the members, requires a regular schedule of meetings. The available electronic technology, including zoom, and cell phones, permit Board of Director members to participate in a regular schedule of meetings. The Board of directors recommends approval of the change. The Board will be able to regulate its schedule of meetings in accordance with the corporation needs and the Board members availability.

Article V

Section 5. There shall be no proxy voting permitted at annual or special membership meetings.

Explanation of The Addition

The Board of Directors recommends the addition of this language to the By Laws. The complexity of proxy voting would place a significant burden on the organization. The corporation's history indicates that this practice is unnecessary. Annual meeting membership attendance has always been strong. The discussion by the members at the meetings creates the best method of continuing the Association, its goals and projects.

4th of July Boat Flotilla!

Come join this year's flotilla on Tuesday, July 4th 2023, starting at 11:00am. The flotilla will begin on Upper Twin Lake's public boat launch. Decorate your boat and join your neighbors on the water this 4th of July. The annual flotilla is enjoyed by so many people on Twin Lakes. The narrows is wide open so we hope you will plan to travel both lakes. Depending on the water level, use caution going under the bridge from the channel area into the lower lake. This event has a history dating back to the 1900's.

Your TLIA Board wishes to remind participants; although your association does not organize the boat flotilla, we proudly support this grassroots participation in celebrating, on a local level, our country's independence.

We do encourage all in our community, as you are enjoying the festivities of the 4th to please clean up firework & water balloon debris from the lake. Thank you for helping to keep our lake clean and healthy.

From your Water District 95-C Watermaster

Last year's irrigation season began with significant rainfall throughout the months of May and June. This made for a good water year, as we were able to deliver water to downstream users along Rathdrum Creek through the summer months and into early fall. An early winter with above-average snowpack is setting us up for another great water season.

We had a pretty good response to our postcards last spring, with nearly two-thirds of the recipients responding to our request. We are still working to find a way to reach everyone, with the goal of clearing the district of those who no longer want their water rights.

We received a large grant last summer from the Kootenai County Aquifer Protection District. The water district and flood district will use the funds to install new measuring equipment at the spillway. This highly accurate gate will provide better data on the volume of water Twin Lakes is contributing to the aquifer, more accuracy for low summer irrigation flows, and a more user-friendly interface for remote operation and monitoring of the dam by both the water and flood control districts. We hope to have it operational by mid-summer.

Please do what you can to conserve water and help keep the water clean for future generations.

Twin Lakes History: 95 Years of Twinlow Camp

It all started with Rev. Mark Freeman who wanted to create a little patch of woods on the shores of Twin Lakes (then called Fish Lake), a place for young people to gather. With that vision in mind, Rev. Freeman worked tirelessly to build cabins and a dining hall, dig a well, and clear hundreds of trees. Rev. Freeman, also the first manager of what we now call Twinlow Camp and Retreat Center, wanted a place out of the city where young people could connect with their Creator.

For more than 90 years, Twinlow has been that place. A place away—a quiet place—a place where young people could go to experience something new and challenging. A culture of grit always has existed here in North Idaho, and it was evident at Twinlow from the very beginning. In the 1920s, folks had no place to stay overnight here nor any running water. Rev. Freeman, with the help of many volunteers, managed to build a camp from nothing. He knew that water was needed for this place to succeed, so he started digging a well—by hand—by himself. Legend has it that he dug 100 feet by himself before the Camp Commission hired professionals to dig the remaining 240 feet. We still use this well at camp today, and we share it with our neighbors.

It started in 1928 and has lasted far beyond that—the culture that all are welcome at Twinlow, that we are a community, and that we are here to offer Christian Hospitality on Holy grounds. During World War II, Twinlow housed soldiers and their families, made room for them to eat together, and offered a place to find peace in a troubled time. This tradition stands, despite the turmoil in “the real world.” Twinlow always will be a safe haven for all to find adventure, relaxation, and rest.



When Twinlow was founded, it was an escape from the noise of war, of the city, of early century new technology taking over the quiet focus on God. Twinlow remains the same escape 95 years later. We invite you to find adventure, rest, and relaxation. Escape to the wilderness.

Spring 2023 – Channel Restoration Project Update Doug Jayne

While boating through the Channel between our two lakes last summer you may have noticed a plume of muddy sediment kicked up by your propeller. That plume is a clue to a problem beneath your boat we need to address. Since dredging was done in the mid-1950s, sediment and aquatic vegetation has filled the channel to the point boats can barely navigate and on occasion pass so close to each other that safety has become an issue. The shallow navigation channel is a major concern because it greatly limits boat access between the lakes late in the summer, and it can cause expensive damage to boat propulsion equipment. Also, propellers of each passing boat stir up nutrients that degrade water quality by promoting growth of aquatic vegetation.



In the spring of 2022, we received permits to suction dredge about two to three feet of sediment across a 40-foot-wide navigation channel between the narrows at Upper Twin Lake east to the bridge at the entrance to Lower Twin Lake and north from the bridge to the channel boat launch.

The Board retained the services Envirodredge, an experienced company, to help us implement the project. The active dredging phase of the project was conducted in October of 2022. Dredging removed 5,350 cubic yards of sediment. Sediment was pumped up to 2,000 feet via floating pipeline to the channel boat launch area. Polymers were then added to the slurry to help separate the water from the sediment and then pumped into two large geo-textile bags. Dewatering of the filter bags has taken place over the past six months. In May, the residual sediment will be loaded and hauled about 3 miles to the Scarcello ranch to be used as a



soil amendment. The boat launch site will then be cleaned up and restored to use by about the end of May. We expect this project to greatly improve late summer navigation through the channel and reduce nutrient loading to Lower Twin Lake.

Estimated project costs are approximately \$250,000. Funding is still needed to support hauling of the de-watered sediment and for cleanup efforts this spring. Stocking Report

Its angler season on Twin Lakes and the fish are biting! It's time to grab your fishing gear and enjoy the nice weather! Did you know the Department of Fish and Game stock over 38,000 catchable-size (10 to 12 inch) rainbow trout within the Panhandle Region? The stock dates for Twin Lakes are:

- May 1-5: 1,420
- May 22-26: 1,420
- May 29 - June 2: 2,840

All you need to get started is a fishing license and some basic tackle. Annual adult fishing licenses cost around \$30, junior licenses (ages 14-17) cost \$16, and youth under 14 fish for free.

Parks and Waterways - Reminder: New Buoys at Channel

The navigational buoys, like street signs, provide information to help boaters navigate safely. The Parks and Waterways Department deployed two navigational buoys before the boating season: one at the bridge entrance of the channel heading towards the upper lake and one at the entrance of

the narrows heading into the channel and towards the lower lake. The Parks and Waterways Department is responsible for the placement and removal at the end of the boating season and redeployment the following boating season.

The speed limit while traveling through the channel no-wake zone is 5 mph. Please be respectful and adhere to this limit for the benefit of the anglers, recreational users, and residents.

Just a reminder, for the Upper and Lower Twin Lakes residents; according to the Idaho Lake Protection Act Buoy brochure "a permit from the Idaho Department of Lands (IDL) is required for all encroachments, including buoys, on navigable waterways in Idaho.

People who place buoys in a navigable waterway without a permit are in violation of the Lake Protection Act and are subject to civil penalties up to \$2,500 plus expenses incurred by the state in enforcing the law. State law regarding buoys is found in Idaho Code Title 58, Chapter 13 and IDAPA 20.03.04. The brochure further states, "Un-permitted buoys and buoys that do not conform to state and federal standards, like the ones pictured below, pose navigational hazards, and distract from the aesthetic beauty of the water."

Let's Make Twin Lakes a Safe place to recreate- Know the safe boating rules

Safe Boating on the Twin Lakes is beneficial to all recreational users and property owners. If you have a rental property, please consider downloading the safe boating brochure and providing it to your rentals. This is especially helpful with short term rentals.

SPEED RESTRICTIONS

Speed limits for all public waterways except the Coeur d'Alene and Spokane Rivers, and Lower Twin Lakes are as follows: (read carefully, this information applies to the Upper Twin Lake and excludes the Lower Twin)

- NO EXCESSIVE WAKE ZONE, within (300') three hundred feet of shoreline or any dock, pier, breakwater, or any person in the water (except Fernan Lake).
- 5 MPH, a NO WAKE ZONE, within (200') two hundred feet of shoreline or any dock, pier, breakwater, or any person in the water.
- 50 MPH during daylight hours
- 15 MPH, or less, within (100') one hundred feet of any other vessel.



- 25 MPH, or less, at night unless otherwise restricted.

Speed limits for Coeur d'Alene River, the Spokane River, and Lower Twin Lakes are as follows: (read carefully, this information applies to the Lower Twin Lake)

- NO EXCESSIVE WAKE ZONE, within (150') one hundred fifty feet of shoreline or any dock, pier, breakwater, or any person in the water (includes Fernan Lake).
- 5 MPH, NO WAKE ZONE, within one hundred feet (100') of shoreline, dock, pier, breakwater, or person in the water, and
- 35 MPH, or less, during the day, unless regulated otherwise.
- 15 MPH within 50' of another vessel
- 25 MPH, or less, at night.

Don't Dump Your Dock

Kootenai County Parks and Waterways Ordinance 6.2.113: Derelict Docks and Float Houses:

A. No person shall allow a personal dock or float house to be released on any public body of water under which the county has boater safety responsibility.

B. Owners of floating devices such as docks and float houses who fail to properly secure them will be subject to payment of recovery and abatement costs.

C. All docks and float houses shall be permanently marked and labeled with the owner's name, address and department of lands registration number on both ends of the dock. The marking or labeling shall be done in a permanent fashion in letters and numbers greater than two inches (2") in size. (Ord. 379, 8-30-2006; amd. Ord. 571, 10-19-2021)
